Report Findings

- **Multi-sectoral and sectoral national CCIV assessments** most important information sources for developing national adaptation policies.
 - Virtually all countries also used stakeholder and expert opinions, information from international and/or European CCIV assessments.
- **Almost all CCIV assessments presented main results for whole country.**
 - More than half information at the sub-national level
 - Most identified regional adaptation priorities.
- **National CCIV assessments - good for overview & setting priorities**
 - But sub-national and local information required to develop targeted adaptation measures.
- **Need for further CCIV information**
 - All countries intend to **update their knowledge base**
 - Future plans - multi-sectoral CCIV assessments & targeted sector-specific or thematic assessments.
